
## My coronavirus vaccination



To keep healthy and safe, I need an injection called a vaccine. It protects people from the coronavirus.



I will drive to the clinic with a support person.



- I will wear a mask.
- I will wait for a nurse to see me.




I will roll my sleeve up so the nurse can see my arm.



The injection will go into my arm for a few seconds, it might hurt.



I will try to sit still. My support person might try to distract me by talking.



Afterwards, we will wait in the clinic for about 15 minutes to check I feel OK.



Then we will go home.



My arm might feel sore. Some people feel unwell the next day too. I can tell someone if I feel sore or sick.



In a couple of days I will be fine. I will be safe from coronavirus.
