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Maths Madness in 5.05!

CLASSRO

This term, 5.05 students have been learning about Money. We have thoroughly enjoyed becoming familiar with Australian money and explored the features of each coin and the color of each note. Students have looked at the values of each coin and note and are learning to compare the values of each one, which is 'more' and which is 'less' when compared with another coin or note. It has been fabulous to see students grouping money by matching coins and then counting how many of each coin they have. Some students are just beginning to make a bar graph to show the number of coins in each group. Some students have also been using their knowledge of counting patterns to total the amount of money they have. For example, we can count 10c coins by using our 'tens' counting pattern. We can use counting by 2s to total groups of \$2 coins.

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The highlight of our money activities has been setting up a shop and students selecting some items they wish to buy. Some students have made their purchases by finding the right coin to match the cost of the item. Others are counting coins or totaling dollar notes and a coin to buy their snacks and treats. The students thoroughly enjoyed having chips or Tiny Teddies, chocolate or cheese from the shop and it made it fun to do 'real shopping'!

The other focus in Maths at the moment is learning more about Time. Students have worked together as a class group, constructing a clock and using this to look closely at the movement of the hands. Students are learning the placement of numbers on an analog clock and moving their hands to demonstrate how time passes from 3 o'clock to 4 o'clock or from 3 o'clock to half past 3. It is exciting to see student recognition at different times throughout the day. Students are making their own clock faces, practicing matching the same times on analog clocks, and sequencing daily activities in the order in which they happen. Students love drawing the 'hands' on laminated clocks as well as manipulating the 'hands' on 'real' clocks. As we learn more about time, we will also be exploring digital time.

SunSmart

at Officer Specialist School

It is that time of the year, the weather warms up and also the UV levels rise. The sun's <u>ultraviolet (UV) radiation</u> is the major cause of skin cancer. UV damage also causes sunburn, tanning, premature aging, and eye damage. The good news is you can prevent damage – and skin cancer – by being SunSmart.

For the best protection, we at Officer Specialist School use all five SunSmart steps in Term 4 and 1(when UV 3 or above):

• Slip on covering clothing

- Students wear our school uniform which has been chosen as it covers as much skin as possible with its collar, sleeves to the elbow, and shorts to the knee.
- Slop on SPF 30 (or higher) broad-spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen.
 - Parent/Carers are to supply personal, suitable, SPF 30 (or higher) sunscreen for their child in their bags.
 - The school will supply an emergency supply of sunscreen for when personal sunscreen is temporarily unavailable.
 - Parents/Carers need to fill out sunscreen permission every year.
 - Staff will encourage and remind students 20 minutes before recess and lunch play to apply sunscreen.
 - On campus and on excursions, students will be reminded and encouraged to apply sunscreen every 2hours.
 - Staff will help students to apply sunscreen if needed.
- Slap on a hat
 - Students are to bring a hat to school.
 - Students are to wear a hat for recess and lunch play and when participating in outside activities.
 - Choose, a broad-brimmed, legionnaire or bucket-style hat which shades your face, nose, neck, and ears.
 - Caps and visors do not provide enough protection.
- Seek shade
 - Students can seek shade by using trees or shade structures.

• Slide on some sunglasses.

• Sunglasses can be worn to reduce UV radiation exposure to the eyes.

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

We're having a wheely good time at Officer Specialist School! Bikes are used as part of some therapy and class-based sessions for students of all abilities. Riding a bike has amazing benefits to our growing students' health and physical development. Bike riding can support a child's self-confidence, physical health, mental wellbeing, and overall development through movement.

Modified and 3-wheeled bikes are a great tool to learn the basics of bike riding and to gain the benefits of physical movement. There are many different bike options to suit individual abilities to promote participation in bike riding. At Officer Specialist School, we have a range of bikes that include modifications such as training wheels, 3 wheels, 4 wheels, and supportive seating. Bike programs are run by both our Physical Education teachers and Physiotherapists.

From balance bikes without pedals to modified bikes, there's a wide range of options to meet children where they are at with bike riding. The more opportunities they have to practice, the more comfortable and confident they will feel when riding a bike, and the more fun they will have!





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Hay Fever & Thunderstorm Asthma Information

HAY FEVER SEASON – October - December

It is that time of the year again when we have students and staff suffering from hay fever symptoms.

- 1. Hay fever treatments:
- 2. Minimise exposure to allergens.
- 3. Medicine eg. Nasal spray, antihistamines, and decongestant sprays
 - Follow your doctor's recommendation for taking medicine for hay fever.
 - If it is a daily non-drowsy antihistamine or nasal spray, then this should be taken in the morning before school or work.
 - If your child requires antihistamine at school then parents need to:
 - Supply antihistamines to the school
 - Fill out a Student Medication Authority
- 4. Monitor pollen levels by downloading the "Melbourne Pollen" app or looking on the "Melbourne Pollen" website.

THUNDERSTORM ASTHMA

Thunderstorm Asthma is triggered by high pollen levels

- and certain types of thunderstorms.
- October December is the highest risk period.
- Pollen particles are released in high winds prior to thunderstorms.
- Particles are breathed in and lodge into the respiratory tract and asthma symptoms rapidly arise.

Who is at greatest risk?

- People with asthma now or in the past
- People with hay fever, allergy to grass pollen
- Undiagnosed asthma

NOTE: Thunderstorm asthma can affect people who have never had asthma

Common symptoms of asthma and thunderstorm asthma:

- Wheezing
- Breathlessness
- A feeling of tightness in the chest
- A persistent cough

Hay Fever & Thunderstorm Asthma Information

How to prepare if at increased risk of thunderstorm asthma:

- People with asthma:
 - Always have a reliever inhaler (blue puffer) and spacer with you.
 - Have an up-to-date Asthma plan and follow this when having any asthma symptoms.
- People with hay fever:
 - See a GP or pharmacist about a hay fever treatment plan.
 - Check with your GP or pharmacist if you should have an asthma reliever puffer.
 - Check the daily pollen count by visiting Melbourne Pollen Count and Forecast
- During high risk of thunderstorm days avoid being outside during thunderstorms and during wind gusts before a storm. Close doors and windows and if using the air conditioner switch to recirculate/recycle.
- Be alert to and act on the development of asthma symptoms as explained in your asthma action plan if you have one or if you don't, use asthma first aid.
- Check the epidemic thunderstorm asthma forecast during the grass pollen season at <u>VicEmergency</u>

Officer Specialist School, Measures to keep our school community safe as the risk of thunderstorm asthma increases:

- All teachers and many ES staff are trained in asthma first aid.
- The school will monitor the VicEmergency app to receive thunderstorm warnings and where appropriate, keep students indoors when weather forecasts identify greater risk.
- Inform parents when Asthma plans need to be updated.


