



In Term Three, 5.02 students have been busy engaging in a variety of hands-on activities. This term we are learning to be Historians. This encouraged students to compare their babyhood and teenage hood with visual and verbal prompts. In Term 3, the class dove straight into their academics with a growing focus on mastering fundamental mathematical operations such as addition, subtraction, and money skills. We have also consistently practiced regrouping to enable us to calculate higher number problems. The students in 7.03 have also engaged consistently with our reading tasks in History-focused lessons. We have explored the different histories of animation, animals, and food.

The students have also joined in different activities to promote awareness and appreciation of the Aboriginal culture, such as our yarning circle at the beginning of the term. The class took turns to talk about their favourite memories as they contributed to a yarning stick which will be kept as a class.

Lacrosse has also been a focus for the class where they have been supported by the coach to learn and apply the fundamental skills of the sport.

The students practiced wholebody movement to run through the course while also applying what they had learned from the lesson on the history of Marvel and its designs by searching for pictures of Marvel characters throughout the school.

We worked hard all week on Father's Day by sharing stories about the mums and dads out there and what a special day Father's Day is.

STRATEGIES TO SUPPORT COMMUNICATION

- Be sure to gain your child's attention before communicating with them. Say their name and wait until they look towards you or stop their activity.
- Please don't speak too fast. Give only keywords of an instruction. Some children may benefit from shorter sentences, for example, rather than saying "Come and sit down on your chair please", we could say "Sit on the chair" whilst pointing to the chair.
- When giving an instruction to a child, provide one step at a time. This increases your child's chance of remembering instructions and carrying them out successfully e.g. if you are telling them to "come and sit down on the chair, take your shoes off and put them by the door" it could be broken down into

"Sit on a chair" "Take off shoes" "Put shoes by the door"

- Use simple visual cues; such as gestures while you speak.
- Give your child time to process questions and instructions before you repeat them. Sometimes your child may require up to 30 seconds to process.
- Try not to always predict your child's needs, even if you know what they may want.Give them the opportunity to communicate their wants and needs.

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School Saving Bonus

Information for government school parents and carers

About the School Saving Bonus

The Victorian Government is making life that little bit easier for families by providing a one-off \$400 School Saving Bonus.

This support will help cover the cost of school uniforms, textbooks, and school activities like camps, excursions and sports.

The School Saving Bonus is in addition to existing and continuing means-tested supports for Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) and the Affordable School Uniforms Program.

The School Saving Bonus will be provided to schools and families in Term 4, 2024.

Who receives the School Saving Bonus

The School Saving Bonus is available for parents and carers of all Victorian government school students from Prep to Year 12 in 2025, except for full-fee international students, home schooled students, TAFE students and students attending kindergarten in 2025.

Actions for parents and carers

Parents and carers of children who meet the School Saving Bonus eligibility above are required to do the following by **Friday 18 October 2024**:

Complete enrolment

If your child, or children are changing government school for Term 1 2025, or starting Prep or Year 7 in 2025, please complete enrolment. For more information, read about <u>Enrolling in</u> <u>School</u>.

Check your contact information

Ensure your contact information is up to date with your school. You can check this information by contacting your school directly.

Accessing the \$400 School Saving Bonus

You do not need to apply for the School Saving Bonus.

The Department of Education will email you in November 2024 with your \$400 School Saving Bonus. You will be able to access it via an online system.

You can decide how to best use the School Saving Bonus for your family's needs. You can choose how to allocate the \$400 in the online system.

The bonus can be used towards 2025 school costs, which may include:

- camps, trips, excursions and incursions
- swimming and sporting programs
- outdoor education programs
- graduations
- school uniforms
- textbooks.

The bonus can be used at your school's approved textbook or uniform suppliers either in-store or online, or through State Schools' Relief. The list of suppliers may include a school uniform or bookshop. Any amount that you choose to allocate to textbooks and uniforms will be valid until 30 June 2025. It will then transfer to your child's school account for future activities.

Funds will roll over for use in future years if it is not all spent in 2025.

Families with more than one eligible child

Families who have more than one child at the same school can combine their School Saving Bonus payments to use on one child, or for a specific activity. So, for example, a family with 3 children who are all government school students would receive support to the value of \$1,200 and choose how they spend those funds. The School Saving Bonus cannot be combined across different schools.
